Vote March 13

The HML has two articles on the ballot. Article 9 is for a bond to build a new Hudson Public Library on Route 102 between Alvirne High School and Hills Garrison School. This article requires a super majority (60% favorable vote) in order to pass. Additionally, Article 16 is for a 3% raise for (non-union) library employees. You may register to vote at the polls on March 13 if you are not currently registered. Bring proof of Hudson residency: driver's license, passport, bill of sale for new home, etc. with you. Voting is at the Community Center (formerly Lions Hall) from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Please Support your library!

This comprehensive, five-volume set is designed to inform and educate readers about a wide variety of drugs and controlled substances. Each entry offers insight into the history, statistics and effects of specific drugs or addictive substances. Although intended for middle and high school students, it is also a useful resource for readers of all ages.

Ailments of ears, nose and throat are some of the most common illnesses facing Americans today. *The Ear, Nose and Throat Disorders Sourcebook* from the Health Reference Series for Consumers covers all disorders of the ears, hearing loss, sinus problems, throat and vocal cord disorders, genetic and congenital deafness, tinnitus, sensorineural hearing disorders, and more. Along with the medical entries is a glossary of related medical terms and a directory of sources for further help and information.
